¹USS Perch was forced to scuttle herself after being mortally wounded in a depth charge attack. All 54 crew members were picked up by the Japanese, and sent to Prisoner of War camps. Six crew members died as Prisoners of War.

²On December 1, 1941, another Triton crew member, Chief Electrician's Mate Harold Ray Thompson, was transferred ashore at Wake Island due to illness. He was subsequently captured, survived the War in POW camp, and was repatriated.

³F-4 crew member James M. Hoggett, electrician, was on shore leave when his boat and shipmates were lost. ⁴TM3 L. E. Kidwell died from injuries sustained in the line of duty in a non-sinking incident. USS Tullibee crew member Clifford W. Kuykendall survived the sinking and Prisoner of War camp.

GOOD OF THE ORDER

USS Thresher to be honored with special postmark stamp

April 10 marks 50th anniversary of nuclear submarine tragedy.

The Portsmouth and Kittery, Maine, post offices are planning a special day to commemorate the 50th anniversary of the loss at sea of the U.S. Navy nuclear-powered submarine USS Thresher.

On Wednesday, April 10, Kittery Postmaster John Wickman, Portsmouth Postmaster Richard Provencher and their staffs will be on hand to stamp letters and postcards with a unique postmark documenting the occasion.

There will be two postmarks — 03804, zip code for the Eternal Patrol Station of the Portsmouth Naval Shipyard; and 03904, the zip code for the Memorial Dedication Station in Kittery, Maine.

Specially authorized by the U.S. Postal Service, this postmark is a way to take home an inexpensive souvenir of the historical event.



The Thresher (SSN 593) was built at Portsmouth Naval Shipyard and was commissioned in 1961. It was the first of its class and the most advanced seagoing vessel of its era. Designed to hunt and destroy Soviet submarines at the height of the Cold War, the Thresher was capable of diving deeper, quieter and deadlier than its counterparts.

The fast-attack submarine was lost April 10, 1963, during deep-dive trials more than 200 miles off the New England coast. The Navy ultimately concluded a piping failure caused the Thresher's nuclear reactor to shut down.

Once the vessel lost power, it sank toward the ocean's bottom before imploding from the sea's crushing water pressure, and 129 lives were lost. Today, it lies below 8,300 feet of water.

"We're expecting about 1,000 pieces of mail to be stamped during the first day or two," Provencher said. "We'll be doing this at the post office on Daniel Street, and we'll be open from 9 a.m. to 5 p.m. on April 10."

After the first couple of days, Provencher said, pieces of mail requesting a stamp will be stamped directly at the Portsmouth Naval Shipyard, put back into an self-addressed, stamped envelope, and mailed back to the sender at no cost.

"There will be a lot of collectors and old-timers from all around the country sending mail to be stamped," he said.

The Kittery Post Office will be open from 8:30 a.m. to 5 p.m. on April 10.

There will be a ceremony at the shipyard that day, but because of security, members from the U.S. Postal Service may or may not be in attendance, said Tom Rizzo, spokesman for the U.S. Postal Service.

"The ceremony will be by invitation only," he said.

Customers wishing to receive the special postmark by mail have until 30 days after the event to send a self-addressed, stamped envelope containing the letter or envelope they want canceled to Postmaster, 80 Daniel St., Portsmouth, NH 03801-9998, or Postmaster, 10 Shapleigh Road, Kittery, ME 03904

We will be getting a base picture and work up a Thresher memorial statement to send to the Thresher ceremony.

Thom Peschke advised the membership that we want to get a base picture with as many members as possible to send to the Thresher Memorial. The picture will be sent with some correspondence and praise for the Thresher. Doug Smith advised that there was such a picture available that could be sent.

Jim Wilhelm informed the membership that Time magazine March 4, 2013 issue devoted its entire new section to the rise of health care costs and the reasons behind them with the primary article being written by Steve Brill.

Thom Peschke emphasized the importance of taking care of the widows of WWII and other deceased veterans as well as those veterans who have difficulty fending for themselves.

QUAL BOAT OF THE MONTH: USS BARBEL (SS-580)



USS *Barbel* (SS-580) was the lead ship of her class of submarines in the United States Navy. She was the second Navy ship named for the barbel, a cyprinoid fish, commonly called a minnow or carp.

The contract to build *Barbel* was awarded to Portsmouth Naval Shipyard in Kittery, Maine on 24 August 1955 and her keel was laid down on 18 May 1956. She was launched on 19 July 1958 sponsored by Mrs. Bernard L. Austin, and commissioned on 17 January 1959, with Lieutenant Commander Ord Kimzey, Jr., in command.

Barbel-class submarines were originally designed and built with bow planes. Around 1960, the *Barbel* had been operating off the coast of the Eastern U.S. while participating in training exercise SLAMEX. Following her first dive of the day to test depth (700 feet), she ruptured a 5" line used for cooling equipment which circulated sea water throughout the boat at ambient pressure. It's rumored that this was a defect in construction when a hole for a junction or valve got mistakenly taped and painted over. Thus for the first part of her career all that was holding out the sea at test depth was a piece of tape and a layer of paint. An emergency blow was performed and on reaching the surface it was found that she had taken on 350 long tons (360 t) of water in the engine room. She entered Portsmouth Naval Shipyard and underwent major repairs of all her piping over 2". At that time, her bow planes were also converted to fairwater planes.

In 1966 *Barbel* accidentally rammed and sank North Vietnam's largest freighter while trying to determine what type of warrelated cargo it was carrying. Although damaged, *Barbel* was able to remain submerged and return to port for repairs.

During the 1950s and 1960s, the early classes of nuclear submarines suffered propulsion plant reliability problems, and occasionally were unable to complete their assigned missions. In 1969, while deployed in WESPAC, *Barbel* was assigned to fill in on a "special mission" for such a nuclear submarine. It was noted by the control room watch standers at that time that there should be some sort of recognition badge, similar to the recently authorized "Polaris Patrol Pin", for diesel boats required to fill in for a broken down nuclear submarine. A contest was held to design the badge. ETR-3(SS) Leon Figurido's winning design was a broadside view of a guppy submarine with SS superimposed on the North Atlantic sail. There were two bare-breasted mermaids facing towards the sail with arms outstretched. Completing the design was a wreath under the



boat, with holes for stars, and centered on the wreath were the letters "DBF" standing for "Diesel Boats Forever". And so was born the DBF pin.

In 1973 *Barbel's* weapons gang set a SUBPAC record for successfully shooting 118 torpedoes that year. This included successful salvo firing two Mark 16-8 exercise torpedoes, and a successful MK 16-8 warshot operational test. In addition the boat performed a zero error Mark 45 torpedo Technical Standardization Inspection conducted by DoD, a Navy Technical Proficiency Inspection, and the torpedomen identified the source of the MK 45 torpedo "flex hose eater problem." For this record, *Barbel* was awarded the 1973 Battle Efficiency "E". "Barbel's" record for firing torpedoes was around 1978. She also succeeded in sinking the aircraft carrier USS *Enterprise* (CVN-65) during Exercise RIMPAC during that same period.

From 19 January 1981 to 22 January, *Barbel* and *Grayback* (SSG-574) participated in ASWEX 81-3U off the coast of the Philippines, an exercise in shallow water ASW. The submarines opposed the transit of the oiler USNS *Navasota* (T-AO-106), which was escorted by the destroyers *John Young* (CTF 75 embarked) and *Elliot*, and frigates *Gray*, *Whipple*, *Lang*, *Ramsey* and through the narrow straits.

On 1 May 1989, while operating off Kyūshū, Japan, three submariners were washed overboard by heavy waves. One sailor was rescued; two drowned.

Barbel was decommissioned on 4 December 1989, and stricken from the Naval Vessel Register on 17 January 1990. The Navy sold *Barbel* to a scrapper who began the process of scrapping her. After the sail, superstructure and induction piping were removed, the scrapper discovered the boat's interior was filled with painted-over asbestos insulation. Scrapping ceased at that time while the scrapper decided what to do with *Barbel*. In the mid-1990s *Barbel* had her sail and superstructure reconstructed out of plywood for a brief role in the movie *Crimson Tide*. Her only scene was departure for patrol. After eight years *Barbel* returned to Navy ownership. She was towed from the berth in San Pedro, California and on 30 January 2001 she was sunk as a target off the California coast in 1,972 fathoms (3,606 m).

Spring is in the air, so why not make some spring rolls. Here's a five star recipe: ENJOY!

This spring roll recipe can be made vegetarian with tofu or with baby shrimp if you prefer. Brimming with vegetables and lots of flavor, these spring rolls make a great appetizer or party food. And they're surprisingly easy to make. Get some help from your children or guests with the rolling, and you'll be crunching on these delicious spring rolls in no time. As a bonus, this spring roll recipe is also fresher and healthier than the spring rolls you'll find in most restaurants.

Prep Time: 35 minutes Cook Time: 10 minutes Total Time: 45 minutes Yield: Approx. 1 dozen spring rolls

Ingredients:

- 3 cloves garlic, minced
- 1 thumb-size piece galangal OR ginger, grated
- 2 green onions, sliced into matchstick pieces
- 1 red chili, minced, OR 1/2 to 1 tsp. cayenne pepper (omit if you prefer very mild spring rolls)
- 1/2 cup shredded or finely chopped cabbage
- 4-6 shiitake mushrooms, cut into matchstick pieces
- 1/2 cup medium to firm tofu, sliced into matchstick pieces (If non-vegetarian: add 1/2 cup cooked baby shrimp)
- approx. 2 cups bean sprouts
- 1/2 cup fresh coriander, roughly chopped
- 1/2 cup fresh basil, roughly chopped
- 2 Tbsp. oil, plus more for deep-frying
- 1 pkg. spring roll wrappers (thawed if frozen)
- STIR-FRY SAUCE:
- 2 Tbsp. regular soy sauce
- 2 Tbsp. fish sauce or vegetarian stir-fry sauce (Lee Kum Kee brand is a good choice.)
- 2 Tbsp. lime juice
- 1/4 tsp. sugar
- TO SERVE:
- Thai sweet chili sauce (available in most supermarkets, Asian section)

Preparation:

- 1. Place 2 Tbsp. oil in a wok or large frying pan over medium to high heat. Add garlic, galangal (or ginger), green onion, and chili. Stirfry until fragrant (about 1 minute). Stir-frying Tip: Add a little water to the wok/pan when it gets too dry instead of more oil.
- 2. Add cabbage, mushrooms, and tofu (or shrimp). As you stir-fry, add the sauce. Stir-fry 1-2 minutes, until vegetables have softened. Remove from heat and add bean sprouts, tossing to mix in. Then do a taste test for salt, adding a little more fish or soy sauce if not flavorful enough.



- 3. To assemble rolls, lay spring roll wrappers on a clean working surface. Place one heaping Tbsp. of filling on each wrapper (if using large wrappers, you will need more). Spread filling along the width of the spring roll wrapper you'll want to do this 2/3 of the way down, closer to you so you have room to roll it. Try not to include too much of the liquid left from the wok/pan (a slotted spoon works well for this).
- 4. Sprinkle some of the fresh coriander and basil over the filling. Then fold the left and right sides of wrapper over filling. Lift up the end nearest you and tuck over, rolling upwards. Secure by dipping your fingers in some water and wetting the end, "pasting" it shut.
- 5. To fry spring rolls, place some oil (about 1 inch deep) in a wok or deep-sided frying pan over medium-high heat. When oil begins to form snake-like lines across the bottom of the pan, the oil is starting to heat up. To test it, dip one corner of a spring roll into the oil. If it begins to sizzle and cook, the oil is ready.
- 6. Using tongs, place spring rolls in oil, allowing them to fry about 1 minute on each side. Spring rolls are done when they turn light to medium golden-brown (see photo). Place on paper towels (or a clean dish towel) to drain while you finish frying the rest.
- Serve spring rolls while still hot with Thai Sweet Chili Sauce, or your own dipping sauce (see recipe above).

TO MAKE YOUR OWN DIPPING SAUCE: Mix 1/3 cup plum sauce with 3 Tbsp. soy sauce. Add fresh cut red chili or dried crushed chili as desired.
