¹ Seventeen U.S. Army personnel who were being transported by **Seawolf** were also lost, and are included on this number. ²Two **USS S-44** crew members survived Prisoner of War camp..

³One man was lost while serving on **USS Darter (SS-227)**. He was not lost when Darter went aground, nor in action against the enemy, but rather had died in an accident.

⁴Nine **USS Tang** crew members survived Prisoner of War camp.

⁵Three men, including the then-Commanding Officer, died in a battery explosion which occurred on October 5, 1918, in the New York Navy Yard. The **O-5** boat was later sunk after collision with SS ABANGAREZ (United Fruit Company) off the Panama Canal, on October 28, 1923.

⁶Sylvester Martin Wright, Steward's Mate, Second Class, is listed as being lost with his shipmates. Records in the National Archives show that he was transferred off the **Albacore** immediately before she was lost.

⁷A number of men survived the sinking of **Sculpin**, but died while being transported from Truk to Japan when IJN Chuyo was sunk by USS Sailfish on December 3, 1943.

QUAL BOAT OF THE MONTH: USS GRENADIER (SS-525)





Members who qualified on the Grenadier include: George Kilmer

USS Grenadier (SS-525), a *Tench*-class submarine, was the second ship of the United States Navy to be named for the grenadier, a soft-finned deep sea fish of the *Macrouridae* with a long, tapering body and short, pointed tail family, also known as rattails. The contract to build her was awarded to the Boston Naval Shipyard, and her keel was laid down on 8 February 1944 in Boston, Massachusetts. She was launched on 10 February 1951 sponsored by Mrs. John A. Fitzgerald, wife of the first *Grenadier*'s last skipper, and commissioned the same day with Commander Henry G. Reaves, Jr. in command.

One of the first Greater Underwater Propulsion Power Program (GUPPY) submarines, *Grenadier* was equipped with a snorkel to permit indefinite running in an awash condition. *Grenadier* proved the worth of this device during her shakedown. Returning from the Caribbean Sea cruise, the new submarine made the seven-day voyage from Guantanamo Bay to New London, Connecticut, submerged. Almost two years of intensive training exercises out of New London were capped by her first yard overhaul at Philadelphia, extending from 16 December 1952 to 22 April 1953.

In June 1953 *Grenadier* participated in the annual midshipman cruise to Rio de Janeiro and other Brazilian ports. Returning to New London via the Caribbean Sea, she then supported ASW exercises during November, as an aircraft carrier task force perfected its antisubmarine operations. *Grenadier* continued training and battle exercises along the New England coast and off the Virginia Capes and in August 1955 cruised to Montreal, Quebec, via the St. Lawrence River.

Grenadier departed New London 3 January 1956 on the first of several Mediterranean Sea cruises. During a three-month deployment she steamed throughout the Mediterranean and both showed the flag and participated in attack and antisubmarine exercises with various units of the Sixth Fleet. On two subsequent Mediterranean deployments from 8 November 1957 to 27 January 1958, and from 10 April to 8 August 1962 she operated with the Sixth Fleet to bolster peace keeping operations in that troubled region of the world.







Between these cruises, the submarine participated in exercises along the East Coast and was a frequent visitor to Caribbean waters. *Grenadier* operated out of New London until 15 September 1959, she transferred to Key West, Florida. From there *Grenadier* served more frequently in the Caribbean, and also patrolled and held exercises along the Atlantic and Gulf of Mexico coasts of Florida.

While on special antisubmarine exercises in the North Atlantic on the morning of 29 May 1959, *Grenadier*, in company with a patrol plane, sighted and photographed a Soviet submarine prowling the waters off Iceland. It was the first confirmed sighting of a Soviet submarine in the Atlantic.

Cuban Missile Crisis

Grenadier again confronted Soviet ships when the Cuban missile crisis threatened nuclear war in October 1962. In company with Balao (SS-285), Threadfin (SS-410), Trutta (SS-421), and Chopper (SS-342), she formed part of the American fleet that blockaded and quarantined Cuba. After the Soviet offensive missiles were pulled out of Cuba, Grenadier was one of several ships dispatched to Cuba in November to assert and confirm the United States' rights and position there.

Grenadier continued patrols and training operations out of Key West. Assigned to SubRon 12, she participated in exercises along the Atlantic coast and in the Caribbean. In addition, she has provided valuable aid during the perfecting of advanced sonar and ASW equipment. She distinguished herself in 1966 gathering navigational data and other information in the Caribbean.

Fate

Grenadier was decommissioned, struck from the Naval Vessel Register and sold to Venezuela on 15 May 1973. Renamed the ARV *Picua* ("Barracuda")-she served in the Venezuelan Navy until 1990

Grilled Glazed Baby Back Ribs

Published May 1, 2013. From Cook's Illustrated

Why this recipe works:

Instead of spending up to 4 hours tending a grill, we make use of water's ability to quickly cook food. Our ribs simmer in seasoned water until they reach 195 degrees, and then we apply a flavorful glaze and grill them up to get tender-chewy ribs in less than half the time.







Try one of the glaze recipes (see related content), or use 1 cup of your favorite glaze or barbecue sauce.

INGREDIENTS

- 2 tablespoons salt
- 2 (2-pound) racks baby back or loin back ribs, trimmed, membrane removed, and each rack cut in half
- 1 recipe glaze (see related content)

INSTRUCTIONS

- 1. 1. Dissolve salt in 2½ quarts water in Dutch oven; place ribs in pot so they are fully submerged. Bring to simmer over high heat. Reduce heat to low, cover, and cook at bare simmer until thickest part of ribs registers 195 degrees, 15 to 25 minutes. While ribs are simmering, set up grill. (If ribs come to temperature before grill is ready, leave in pot, covered, until ready to use.)
 - **2A. FOR A CHARCOAL GRILL:** Open bottom vent halfway. Light large chimney starter filled with charcoal briquettes (6 quarts). When top coals are partially covered with ash, pour evenly over grill. Set cooking grate in place, cover, and open lid vent halfway. Heat grill until hot, about 5 minutes.
 - **2B. FOR A GAS GRILL:** Turn all burners to high, cover, and heat grill until hot, about 15 minutes. Turn all burners to medium-high.
 - **3.** Clean and oil cooking grate. Remove ribs from pot and pat dry with paper towels. Brush both sides of ribs with 1/3 cup glaze. Grill ribs, uncovered, flipping and rotating as needed, until glaze is caramelized and charred in spots, 15 to 20 minutes, brushing with another 1/3 cup glaze halfway through cooking. Transfer ribs to cutting board, brush both sides with remaining glaze, tent loosely with aluminum foil, and let rest for 10 minutes. Cut ribs between bones to separate, and serve.

Speeding Up the Process with Water—Without Watering Down Flavor

For their tough collagen to break down and the meat to turn tender, ribs must reach about 195 degrees—a process that takes several hours on the grill. The most effective shortcut is to boil the ribs before they go on the fire. Boiling brings the meat up to 195 degrees in a matter of minutes, at which point the ribs need only a quick stint over the coals to char. But boiling also dulls flavor (and risks overcooking the thinner end of the rib). Here's how we got water to speed up the process—without washing away meaty taste.



SIMMER IN A BRINE: Cooking the ribs in a concentrated saltwater solution allows the salt to penetrate the meat, seasoning it throughout and making up for the loss of pork flavor. Because food can never rise above the temperature of its environment, simmering the meat (at about 200 degrees) instead of boiling it (at 212 degrees) means that the thinner end of the rib won't overcook as the thicker end more slowly comes up to 195 degrees. The upshot: moister meat from end to end.

FINISH ON THE GRILL: After simmering, the now-tender ribs need only 15 to 20 minutes over the fire (and a few coats of glaze) to develop a nice lacquer and char flavor.\







Hoisin-Coconut Glaze

Published May 1, 2013. From Cook's Illustrated

Why this recipe works:

For interesting alternatives to barbecue sauce, we use no-cook ingredients that color quickly over the fire.

MAKES ABOUT 1 CUP

INGREDIENTS

- 2/3 cup hoisin sauce
- 1/3 cup canned coconut milk
- 3 tablespoons rice vinegar
- 3/4 teaspoon pepper

INSTRUCTIONS

1. Whisk all ingredients together in bowl.

Lime Glaze Published May 1, 2013. From Cook's Illustrated

Why this recipe works:

For interesting alternatives to barbecue sauce, we use no-cook ingredients that color quickly over the fire.

MAKES ABOUT 1 CUP

INGREDIENTS

- 2/3 cup lime juice (6 limes)
- 1/3 cup ketchup
- 1/4 cup packed brown sugar
- 1 teaspoon salt

1. Whisk all ingredients together in bowl.

Spicy Marmalade Glaze

Published May 1, 2013. From Cook's Illustrated

Why this recipe works:

For interesting alternatives to barbecue sauce, we use no-cook ingredients that color quickly over the fire.

MAKES ABOUT 1 CUP

INGREDIENTS

- 2/3 cup orange marmalade
- 1/3 cup cider vinegar
- 2 tablespoons hot sauce
- 3/4 teaspoon salt

INSTRUCTIONS

1. Whisk all ingredients together in bowl.

2. Peach Bourbon BBQ Sauce

2 cups of Sweet Baby Ray's BBQ sauce

 $\frac{1}{4}$ cup ripe fresh or frozen peaches (peeled, seeded and chopped), or substitute peach preserves $\frac{1}{4}$ Tbsp Bourbon







Mix and heat to render down to a thicker sauce.
